## What a lucky bunch we are!


Next week is World Book Day and while everyone else is watching The Biggest Book Show on Earth online, we can actually be some of the very few that say we saw it live!

## Safer Internet Day 2018 follow up

Here are some ideas of online safety resolutions you could make as a family in 2018.

## Have an open and honest conversation

The easiest way to get involved with your children's online lives is through discussion. You might like to start by asking them about what they enjoy doing online to help you start a discussion. However you choose to do it, resolving to talk with your children regularly about their internet use is a fantastic way to help keep them safe online in 2018.

## Create a family agreement

A great way to think about your internet use as a family and to help make sure that everybody understands the importance of staying safe and positive online.

## Take a look at your accounts, whether gaming, social media or email

This is a really practical resolution that might help start a conversation with your children about their <u>digital footprint</u>. By taking a look at accounts, you can check your privacy and security settings and review what each member of your family has shared online in 2017 (or even further back!) and whether you're happy for it to stay there. You could also consider whether you're still using old accounts and think about <u>deleting or deactivating</u> any that you don't use anymore.

### Play and use the internet together

The internet has lots of exciting things to see and do – why not resolve to spend some time as a family exploring the online world together? You could play some of your child's favourite games or research a topic you both find interesting. This is a great opportunity to make sure that everyone is aware of the safety features offered on different games or to talk about what information we can trust online.

## Know how to report and block

There are lots of really useful tools online to help you deal with behaviour or content that is upsetting, and it is important that you as a parent know where to go to if your child needs help reporting or blocking online. For 2018 a good resolution might be to look at the different options for reporting and blocking available on the sites your family use and to make sure that everybody understands them and feels confident using them. More information about reporting can be found on our social media guide, these have guidance about a range of sites including Snapchat, Instagram and Movie Star Planet.

### **RE:** Important online safety messages

SnapChat, an app used regularly by many children and young people, has recently launched a new feature called SnapMaps that lets users track each other's movements in real time. This has raised safety concerns and fears of bullying and stalking. SnapMaps allows users to see the location of their contacts. This feature allows others to accurately pinpoint where users are.

You may find the information useful and want to share it with your children and discuss with them the dangers of such functions.

Please also be mindful that **the recommended age limit for Snapchat is** 13 so we would warn against any persons of primary school age using this or similar apps.

Our children deserve our undivided attention and we need to model best communication practice to them when bringing them to school and picking them up from school.

If we are seen as over reliant on our phones and if we always put our mobile phone as our first priority then we will only reinforce a growing obsession among our children that using a mobile phone is more important than face to face communication.

Mobile phone communication also brings more risks to our safety and is clearly not exceptional everyday in action!

This being the case, the school requests that our school and playground is mobile phone free between the hours of 8.45—9.00 a.m. and 3.15—3.45 p.m. every day. We are smoking free and dog free at these times and the now we want to address the scourge (the menace/bane) of the mobile phone.
