"From computer coding to toilet unblocking, we need well-rounded citizens, not rote-taught robots — and what you learn shouldn't depend on where you live.


In science, there would be more practical work.... more trips to science museums.... Girls would be encouraged to pursue STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) subjects.

The focus of any curriculum should not simply be on attainment & resilience but on producing confident, well-rounded citizens who feel as though they belong and have value in society."




