Government advice at this time allows schools to run plays and nativity performances.

What precautions can parents take if they are attending a play or event? You should take a rapid lateral flow test if you're going to be coming into contact people you don't normally meet. You can order tests <u>online</u> or visit a pharmacy. If your test is positive you should isolate and <u>get a PCR test</u>.. It's a good idea to wear a face covering in crowded or enclosed areas.



Camelot does it again!

Laptops for all Year 2 children sourced! (laptops to be distributed before the end of term)



This means that every child in Year 2 to Year 6 should start the holidays and 2022 with their own school laptop. The laptop is a permanent loan from the school for the time that children attends Camelot School.

Please return any laptop, charger and carrycase when your child leaves Camelot.

Please note, we can replace broken laptops due to preventable damage and request that parents/carers replace faulty chargers (costing approximately £20).

Every child in Year 2 to Year 6 can now access their homework online weekly* as well as access their Google Classroom page should the need arise.

* Year Group Homework expectations below:

Year 6

"Pupils have daily homework tasks on Google Classroom. On Mondays and Tuesdays, children revise their knowledge on times tables and consolidate their newly-acquired Maths knowledge. On Wednesdays and Thursdays, children complete their reading comprehension by reading numerous text that are mostly published by Black authors, with focusing on retrieval and inference skills. On Fridays, children engage in Curriculum work, that broadens their understanding of Science, History and Geography."

Year 5

"In Year 5, homework is set weekly on a Friday and expected to be completed by the following Wednesday. The homework is uploaded and completed on Google Classroom. For Maths, the children will have an activity based on their current learning area to consolidate their understanding. In English, the children will have weekly spellings to learn, as well as a reading and writing activity. Often, the reading activity will be related to their curriculum topic for the term."

Year 4

"We use a Google document distributed weekly on Y4 Google Classroom covering expectations for spellings, times tables, Maths focus for the week and a reading comprehension. This is supported by Maths frames and EdShed games."

Year 3

"Homework is given out across Year 3 on google classroom and handwriting tasks sheets are handed out on paper to complement the week. We also expect reading at home every day and to learn set spellings and times tables on a weekly basis. Parental support with task completion is greatly appreciated.

Year 2

Year 2 use google classroom for: curriculum, English, maths, phonics, spelling. Set on Fridays for the following Wednesday. We also expect reading at home every day. We also assign EdShed games to support times tables and spelling.

Year 1

Year 1 send homework out on paper which is stuck into their homework books by staff. There is a maths, English, phonics task as well as other activities set which might include EdShed online tasks. Thank you



Which flu vaccine should children and young people have?

There are 3 types of flu vaccine available for children and young people in 2021 to 2022 - the nasal spray live attenuated influenza vaccine (LAIV), the injected inactivated egg grown influenza vaccine (QIVe) and the injected inactivated cell grown influenza vaccine (QIVc). This chart indicates which vaccine they should have.

– What is the child or young person's age? –

under 6 months of age

Under 6 months of age they are too young to have the flu vaccine (this is why it is important that expectant mothers have a flu vaccination: pregnant women can have the flu vaccine at any stage of their pregnancy)

6 months to under 2 years

Are they in an at-risk group?

They should have the injected inactivated quadrivalent influenza vaccine QIVe (egg-grown). Children in this age group who have never had a flu vaccination will need 2 doses 4 weeks apart

They are not eligible for the flu vaccine

2 years to less than **16 years** of age⁽ⁱ⁾

Three steps to find options and places to get help

Step 1: What's the problem?

I suddenly have no money

- · Lost job or reduced hours
- Money stopped

Step 2: What are some options?

Council Local Welfare Schemes

Council Tax Reduction

People on low incomes or already claiming national welfare benefits such as Universal Credit may also be eligible for help with their council tax bill. www.southwark.gov.uk/benefits-and-support/council-tax-reduction

Discretionary Housing Payment (DHP)

People on low incomes and already getting help to pay their rent through national welfare benefits e.g. Universal Credit (housing element) or housing benefit could, in some very limited circumstances, be eligible for extra support. www.southwark.gov.uk/benefits-and-support/housing-benefit/get-extra-help

Southwark Emergency Support Scheme (SESS)

If you are facing a crisis or find yourself suddenly unable to meet your most basic needs or are in debt with council tax or other household bills you may be eligible for help. (0207 525 2434) www.southwark.gov.uk/benefits-and-support/emergency-support

Maximise Your Income

Anyone who is struggling financially can get a benefit check and speak to an advisor for free and confidential advice. A benefit check can ensure that you are receiving all the money you're entitled to, especially if your circumstances have changed recently. Speaking to an advisor could also help you find cheaper deals on things like gas and electricity and make sure you're not missing out on things like school clothing grants.

Debt Advice

Debt can happen to anyone. Free advice and support can help you find ways to manage your debts and reduce how much you pay each month.

Those seeking debt advice from recognised providers such as Step Change, Citizens Those seeking debt advice from recognised providers such as step change, outlets Advice, or Christians Against Poverty may be offered **Breathing Space** – a statutory scheme which means that creditors must immediately halt all debt recovery action for up to 60 days (up to 90 days for those with mental health problems).

4 Benefit Advance

If you have made a new claim for benefit and are in financial hardship while you wait for your first payment, you may be able to get an advance to afford things like rent or food. It's important to get advice before taking out an advance. Benefit advances must be paid back, and the money will be taken from your future benefit payments (a loan).

O DWP Hardship Payment

If you have been sanctioned, you may be able to request a hardship payment from the Jobcentre. Hardship payments are not always paid immediately, and they're not available to everyone. Hardship payments of Universal Credit need to be paid back (a loan), but hardship payments of Job Seekers Allowance or Employment Support Allowance do not (not a loan).

6 Challenge a Decision

You can challenge a benefit decision if your benefit has been stopped / sanctioned / reduced /refused or you have been overpaid. Most benefit decisions need to be challenged

Step 3: Where can I get help? Each of these services offer free and confidential advice
