Managing Covid—what now?

The UK Health Security Agency published updated guidance on 24 February

- no longer recommends regular testing for pupils/staff without symptoms
 - ends legal requirement to self-isolate following a positive test.
- positive tested adults/children advised to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they have received 2 negative test results
 - unvaccinated contacts no longer asked to self-isolate if in contact

If your child tests positive please ask for advice as full isolation is not always necessary

Research on parental involvement in their child's education has shown...


"What's the most accurate predictor of <u>academic achievement</u>? It's not socioeconomic status, nor how prestigious the school is that a child attends. The best predictor of pupil success is the extent to which families encourage learning at home and involve themselves in their child's education. When parents are <u>engaged</u> in their children's school lives, students have the home support and knowledge they need to not only finish their school work but also develop a lifelong love of learning. Teachers who focus on parent engagement often see a profound change in their classrooms. The more parents involved in their children's education, the better their entire class's motivation, behaviour, and the outcomes become."

"Parental involvement is essential for child development and offers many benefits. ... It also **helps improve pupil behaviour in the classroom**. Having parents and teachers communicate more helps students feel more motivated in their classes; their self-esteem and attitudes in class improve "

What is CHAMPS you may ask?



#CHAMPS

CHAMPS is Camelot's Holiday Provision which is run for 8 weeks every year.. yes that's eight additional weeks of free activities and fun in addition to the usual 38 school learning weeks in a year.

Camelot School is the only school in Southwark that can offer 46 weeks of free provision to its pupils.

How is this offered? The school has to work really hard to source the funds to offer CHAMPS and to ensure we have the staff to provide everything for the children.

#No.1inLondon

In 2021, the school was the No.1 provider of food parcels to its community after taking on the responsibility requested of schools. Again in 2022, Camelot finds itself as the No.1 school in London for providing free provision to its community. At the heart of this offer is CHAMPS.

In 2022, Camelot will expand its CHAMPS offer to children of neighbouring schools so if you have friends with primary aged children please be ready to sign them up for Easter CHAMPS 2022.

Troy Deeney calls for more diversity in English schools' curriculum

Footballer and father says children should be given a 'balanced and inclusive understanding' of Britain

The footballer Troy Deeney is launching an impassioned plea for more widespread teaching of black, Asian and minority ethnic experiences by schools in England, to help combat racism and give children "a balanced and inclusive understanding" of Britain.

In an open letter to the education secretary, Nadhim Zahawi, Deeney said he had been frustrated by the lack of progress on tackling racism in the two years since the killing of George Floyd in the US, saying that "an eerie quiet"


had ended public debate.

Camelot School has accepted the challenge of helping Southwark Schools to guide themselves through the minefield of curriculum delivery in a school at this time. We look forward to updating you all on how we get on going forward.



The survey of 1,000 secondary and primary school teachers, carried out this month, found that only 12% felt empowered to teach "optional" black-related topics such as colonialism, migration and identity ahead of competing optional topics, while 75% said they were not aware that resources to teach cultural diversity across the curriculum were available.

It found that 54% of teachers believed the school system or national curriculum has a racial bias, rising to 93% among minority ethnic teachers.

"My only experience of black history or black culture was through the food or music I experienced at home, whilst at school I felt detached. Not only was I not taught about positive role models who looked like me, I was even told by one teacher that I'd be dead by the time I was 25," Deeney said.

He was excluded from school at the age of 15 and left without any qualifications. Later, as a professional footballer, he studied and passed GCSEs in English, maths and science.

"As my mum always says to me, you can't understand where you're going if you don't understand where you've come from. Whether it's too late for my generation, we need to lay a pathway for longer-lasting change for our kids as I believe the current system is failing children from ethnic minorities," Deeney said.




Basic


World Book Day is next Thursday 3rd March
