# BIOGRAPHY

Dr Benjamin Obadiah Iqbal Zephaniah was born and raised in Birmingham, England. He cannot remember a time when he was not creating poetry but this had nothing to do with school where poetry meant very little to him, in fact he had finished full time education at the age of 13. His poetry is strongly influenced by the music and poetry of Jamaica and what he calls 'street politics'. His first real public performance was in church



when he was 10 years old, by the time he was 15 he had developed a strong following in his home town of Handsworth where he had gained a reputation as a young poet who was capable of speaking on local and international issues.

#### The Camelot School 2018-2023 SEF... five years in the making

To many schools the last few years have been extraordinary, some may say tumultuous from the norm of their experiences prior to March 2020. To Camelot School, the last five years have been anything other than extraordinary and in terms of a self-evaluation exercise we might say it's been exceptional and what we may add...exceptional everyday.

In 2018, the school was judged good for its capacity and trajectory of improvement (both observations acknowledged by Anna Bosher, lead for the inspection and Bola Soneye-Thomas, additional inspector – both inspectors who have stayed in touch with the school for what they acknowledge in recognition for the remarkable achievement of the school since 2016 and the mountain that they recognised the school would need to climb in the years to come).

The exceptional years of 2018-2023 at Camelot School might overlook on the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic in terms of achievements and influence even though the legacy has only added to the 'height of the mountain' we climb at this time at our school. The table below gives an insight into how the context of the last five years influences our self-evaluation of the school today.

Key factors upon which our 2023 self-evaluation is drawn as opposed to the school's 2018 context which was judged good by inspectors in January 2018

Leadership and Management:

Teaching staff team:
- For 2023, staff team is stable, harmonious and while reflective of the significant
ongoing challenges their qualities are noted as exceptional
- The school has needed to train its own staff, currently there are 4 ECTs in the
team, but there is considerable depth of experience across the staff team
- There are no staff vacancies in 2023 in teaching, support staff or leadership

Teaching and Learning and impact of pupil outcomes: From an Ofsted perspective it was noted "All teachers implement the school's approach to teaching, learning and assessment consistently. The feedback that they give to pupils is effective. As a result, pupils make good progress." With the advice that what the school needed to do to improve further was "To ensure that lessons are always pitched appropriately for pupils across the curriculum so that: - they deepen their learning - there are improved levels of engagement from pupils who are too easily distracted - most-able pupils are sufficiently challenged."	<ul> <li>Teaching and Learning and impact of pupil outcomes: <ul> <li>The school consolidated the improvements noted in 2018 and began to close the significant gaps in pupils' prior knowledge that were at the heart of the standards agenda. Year on year progress in KS2 outcomes noted.</li> <li>Mock SATs outcomes in March 2020 recorded attainment outcomes in above 2019 national outcomes before 2020 national assessments ceased.</li> <li>The school's KS2 2022 national outcomes exceeded national averages.</li> <li>EYFS, Phonics Screening Check, KS1 outcomes + Maths multiplication checks and other determiners of pupil outcomes are in line with national expectations.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
Curriculum Provision: From an Ofsted perspective it was noted "The curriculum is broad and enriching. Pupils engage well with topics that are meaningful. They value trips that broaden their horizons and have access to a range of sporting opportunities. This is encouraging pupils to attend school more regularly. However, there are times when some pupils lose concentration because the work is either too easy or too hard."	<ul> <li>Curriculum Provision:</li> <li>The school continues to provide its pupils with their own 'Camelot context rich' curriculum and has gone on to share this with other schools.</li> <li>Knowledge rich teaching methods further develop the curriculum offer and provision is complimented by an exceptional range of opportunities.</li> <li>Middle and senior leadership of the curriculum is now a strength in the school.</li> </ul>
Pupil roll and impact on pupils' personal development:	Pupil roll and impact on pupils' personal development:
<ul> <li>By 2018, the school's roll had begun to change due to a significant drop off in pupil numbers in the local area and due to community choice for other schools.</li> <li>Ofsted noted the pupil roll was 508 - approximately 70 pupils per year group.</li> <li>New opportunities introduced to the school, including the range of after school clubs, were noted by parents as starting but equally as recently as Autumn 2016, parent survey support for the school had been as low as 56%*.</li> <li>(** in 2022, over 96% of parents surveyed noted their satisfaction)</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>In recent years, pupil numbers in the area have plummeted with year groups now averaging approximately 50 pupils. This has meant consecutive yearly budget cuts of £200,000+ per year. Even though in 2021 the school was noted as the fastest growing school in Southwark and in 2022 admitted 26 new 'in year' pupils.</li> <li>The vast majority of the school's roll are first generation UK pupils, unfamiliar with a UK curriculum, context and living in situations where priorities are unpredictable.</li> <li>The school has adapted its provision to meet the needs of its pupil roll, from being the number one school in London for delivering food parcels to its families to being the only Southwark provider of Free Holiday provision so that pupils can attend school for up to 44 weeks a year.</li> </ul>

#### Why we think we are.... Exceptional:

- Recognition of what we have achieved in the context of the last five years...
  - managing a significant falling roll;
  - balancing significant year on year annual budget cuts;
  - welcoming significant in-year pupil enrolment;
  - all the while ensuring zero pupil exclusion and above average attendance all within a school that has gone from strength to strength and exceeded national outcomes at the end of KS2 in 2022
  - all the time having over 96% parental survey satisfaction
  - and even though the overwhelming challenge of the school is recognised by staff, parents, governors, local authority, Camelot have been able to support a neighbouring school with a second Ofsted RI judgement.
- Recognition of on-going capacity and trajectory of the dedicated staff, leaders and governor team
  - led for the seventh consecutive by a leadership team committed to 'fighting' the challenges faced by the school and often evidenced through the significant percentage of pupils with additional educational needs
  - increasingly serving a central role in the local context... Camelot School is a flagship school for School Food; is the Racial Literacy Curriculum Hub for Southwark as well as the only school offering over 200 places every holiday (six weeks a year) to its free holiday provision
  - currently awaiting an outcome of an application to Southwark for additional funds for being a school to have been able to increase its pupil roll year on year in a time of significant falling roll in the local area
- Recognition of pupil progress, outcomes, personal development and happiness to be part of Camelot School
