Post Ofsted 2018—What happens now?

Parents/Carers will know that the school was recently visited by Ofsted Inspectors as part of the government's system of checking the standards of education in schools. Such an inspection is extremely important for all schools but it is particularly important for our school after recent years and recent inspection outcomes.

A school's aim is to demonstrate to the inspectors that the school is making significant improvements and if standards are still a focus that the school has the capacity and the plans to meet the expectations set by you the parents/carers as well as held by the government for any state run school.

Our inspection was a very successful experience for everyone at Camelot and we are very much looking forward to sharing with all our pupils and parents/carers as well as the wider school community the outcome that was decided. It is likely our report will be released next week and we look forward to keeping you informed of any final judgements reached.

The inspectors wanted us to pass on their thanks for the enormous amount of parental feedback that they received and which helped them in reaching their conclusions. Over 200 parent surveys were completed and we look forward to sharing the outcomes of these surveys in a separate newsletter.

- Please refrain from sending your child in with non uniform items, e.g. shoes, PE kits.

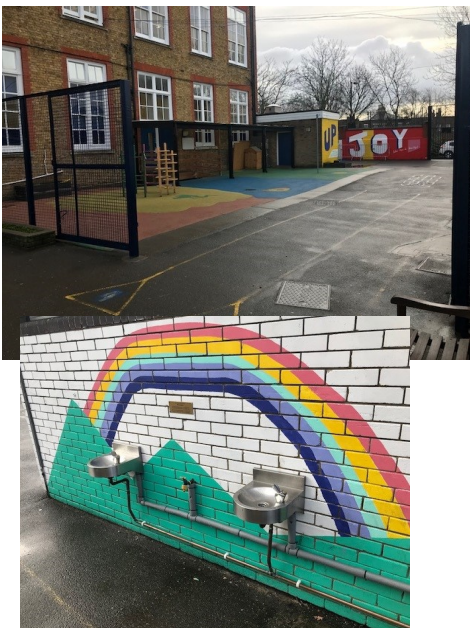

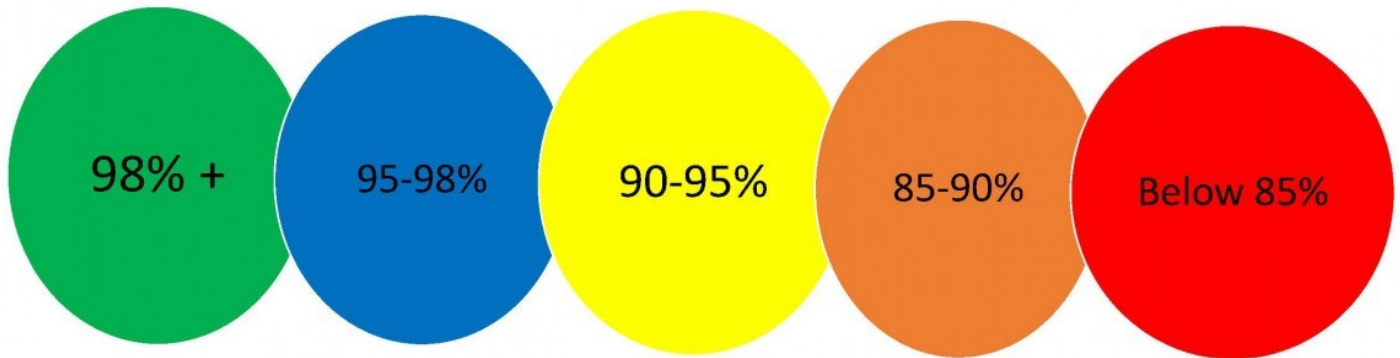

On Time: First Time, Every Time



What Zone Are You In?

What the Camelot School zones mean for parents and children?

Green Zone—Prize Winners—able to participate in all school events and opportunities linked to exceptional attendance

Blue Zone—with exceptional attendance for the rest of the year these children will get into the green zone and will be able to join in the exceptional attendance events

Yellow Zone—Attendance improvements needed and school attendance team will monitor to ensure no further issues

Orange Zone—child and family situation discussed with the school's educational welfare officer and individual attendance instructions will have to be followed, e.g. all absences needing written authorisation

Red Zone—Educational Welfare Officer advises that situation for the child and parent/carer is reviewed to decide what action to take. Court order, parenting orders, fines for attendance all decisions taken in these cases

Impact of Lateness

Being 15 minutes late each day is the same as missing 2 weeks of school
